

Mac,

I am a financial analyst and am dabbling in the world of contracting. I'm not an expert by any means and am trying to learn the basics. I hear the terms PWS and SOW used and it seems to be interchangeable and I wondered if they were the same thing. Your help is needed.

Dear Joe,

Performance Work Statements (PWS) and Statement of Work (SOW) are not the same, although I've also heard them used as if they were. The Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR), which governs acquisitions for the federal government, provides the following guidance:

Performance Work Statement is a statement of work for performance-based acquisitions that describes the required results in clear, specific and objective terms with measurable outcomes. Performance-based acquisition is structured around the results to be achieved as opposed to the manner by which the work is to be performed. In a PWS, the government tells the contractor what needs to be accomplished, not how to do it. The PWS has two mandatory features: (1) work stated in terms of outcomes or results, rather than methods of performance; and (2) measurable performance standards and a method of assessing contractor performance against those standards.

There is no definition in the FAR for a Statement of Work, or SOW. SOW is a term used by the Government to describe requirements in terms of detailed instructions to the contractor. The Government tells the contractor what we want accomplished and, in some instances, how the work should be done. By describing the work in such detail, the government essentially provides the preferred approach or solution to the problem

Another term that can be thrown into the mix is a Statement of Objectives (SOO). The Statement of Objectives is a government-prepared document that states the overall performance objectives. It is used in solicitations when the Government intends to provide the maximum flexibility to each offeror to propose an innovative approach.

As you can see they are not the same thing and although all are used in solicitations, each is used for a different purposes.
